AARP Tax-Aide Program Concluding a Successful Season – Free tax assistance by AARP volunteers is available until Tuesday, April 18, 2017, at the Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike in Annandale. AARP volunteers provide walk-in service on Mondays and Thursdays from 1 to 8 p.m.; Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:30 a.m. until 1 p.m.; Saturdays from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. All returns are filed electronically. Because Emancipation Day (April 16) is a holiday in the District of Columbia and will be observed on Monday, April 17, the deadline for federal taxes this year is Tuesday, April 18. File Virginia taxes before the deadline on Monday, May 1. Remember to bring documents, such as last year's tax return, a photo ID, and Social Security cards for taxpayers and all dependents. Residents with illnesses or infirmities, which confine them to their homes, may schedule appointments with AARP for tax preparation services by calling 703-594-6576. <u>Community Meeting to Discuss a Comprehensive Plan Amendment Proposed for 6060</u> <u>Arlington Boulevard in Falls Church</u> – You are invited to attend a community meeting to discuss a Comprehensive Plan Amendment for the property located at 6060 Arlington Boulevard in Falls Church, on **Monday, April 3, 2017** at 7 p.m. at the Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike in Annandale. The subject property is 3.64 acres and currently contains a medical office building. The proposed Plan Amendment recommends residential use at a density up to 12 dwelling units per acre. This change could result in approximately 43 townhomes, if a rezoning of the property subsequently is approved by the Board of Supervisors. Cleanout Medicine Cabinets of Unused and Expired Prescriptions on National Prescription Drug Take-Back Day – On Saturday, April 29, 2017, from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m., the Fairfax County Police Department, in collaboration with the U.S. Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administration Diversion Control Division, will take back unused and expired medications for proper disposal. Stations serving Mason District include: Mason District Station, 6507 Columbia Pike in Annandale; Franconia District Station, 6121 Franconia Road in Alexandria; and West Springfield District Station, 6140 Rolling Road in Springfield. Only prescriptions in liquid or pill form may be dropped off. No needles or pressurized canisters will be accepted. Disposal is free, safe, convenient, and confidential. <u>Gang Activity and Prevention</u> – Gang activity has been rising across the Washington, D.C., region lately. Our police school resource officers watch for signs of gang activity and gang recruitment in our schools, and we need everyone's support to keep this dangerous problem at bay: parents/guardians, police, schools, health and human services providers, the court system and others. Gang activity is the primary focus for the Northern Virginia Regional Gang Task Force, as well as our Police Department, which has a gang investigations unit that examines all gang-associated crime. It's important to note that according to police, gangs are actively and successfully recruiting new members, especially in middle school. <u>The Quick 411</u> – My family just got a dog. Can Fairfax County offer some tips for responsible dog ownership? Yes. It's always dog season in Fairfax County! With more than 87,000 registered pups, many of us love our dogs (or at least like our neighbor's dog). Of course, there are some people who may not care for excessive barking or dog waste that's not picked up, too, so **it's important to be a responsible owner**. Here is a simple list of ways to be a responsible dog owner in our county:

1.) Identify Your Pet – Make sure your dog wears a collar with a current license and ID tag and has a microchip with up-to-date information.

2.) Vaccinate Your Dog – Proof of a valid rabies vaccine is required for licensing your dog in Fairfax County. Check with your vet to determine what other vaccines are most appropriate for your dog.

3.) Get Your Dog Licensed – All dogs four months and older must have a <u>license which is</u> renewed annually.

4.) Spay or Neuter Your Pet – Each year, three to four million homeless pets are euthanized in the United States. By spaying or neutering, you are doing your part to reduce pet overpopulation. Dogs that have this routine surgery tend to have longer, healthier lives and are less likely to roam.

5.) Enroll Your Dog in a Training or Obedience Class – Positive training will allow you to control your dog's behavior safely and provides a terrific opportunity to enhance the bond you share with your dog. Training builds communication, understanding and mutual respect. The Park Authority offers basic and advanced obedience classes. Register by visiting <u>Parktakes</u> <u>Online</u>.

6.) Keep Your Dog Physically Fit – Up to 45 percent of pets in the United States are overweight or obese. To keep your dog happy and healthy, make sure you exercise your dog every day. Twice daily walks are enough for some dogs while others benefit from the additional exercise, play time and socialization they get from regular visits to a dog park.

7.) **Obey Leash Laws** – In Fairfax County, dogs are required to be on a leash at all times in public areas unless they're in a <u>designated off-leash area</u>.

8.) Clean Up After Your Dog – Pick up dog waste and dispose of it in a public trash can or at home. Dog waste is not only unsightly, but it pollutes groundwater and is harmful to wildlife.

9.) Protect Your Dog From the Elements – If the temperature outside is too cold or hot for you, it is also too cold or hot for your pet. Pets should be kept indoors and never leave your pet in a car when the outside temperature is above 70 degrees.

10.) Give Your Dog Companionship – Dogs left alone for long hours are more likely to exhibit undesirable behaviors including aggression and separation anxiety. If you are away from your home long hours, consider hiring a dog walker or getting a companion for your pet. The <u>Animal</u> <u>Shelter</u> has lots of loving pets waiting to meet you!
