Elsewhere in this newsletter you will find volunteer opportunities and other holiday events, including how to care for live Christmas trees in your home. If you decorate your home for the holidays, please be especially careful about use of your indoor fireplace, or outdoor fire pit, too. A frequent cause of house fires during the winter is improperly discarded ashes. Always be sure that the fire is out, and douse any remaining embers with water. Remove the ashes to a covered metal can, never in a plastic or paper bag, and place the can away from the house (not in the garage) until the ashes are collected by your trash company or used in the garden. If you do have the unfortunate experience of a house fire, get everyone out of the house, and call 911. Belongings can be replaced; loved ones can't.

Bailey's Crossroads Community Shelter's Hypothermia Prevention Program

– From **December 1, 2018 to March 31, 2019**, the county's hypothermia program is operational, thanks to partnerships with volunteers, churches, non-profit organizations, and individuals, who donate hot meals, breakfast items, beverages, and snacks. **Meals**, such as one-dish casseroles, soups, salad, entrees, vegetables, bread/rolls, and dessert are needed **for 30 people** for the following dates: December 2-11 and December 13-15, 2018; January 2-5, January 7-8, and January 11-19, 2019; and March 10-12 and March 17-24, 2019. Two individuals also are needed to help serve the meals. Join the Police Civilian Review Panel at its 2018 Public Forum – The public is invited to attend the Police Civilian Review Panel's 2018 Public Forum on Monday, December 10, 2018 at the Mount Vernon Governmental Center, 2511 Parkers Lane, from 7 to 9 p.m. At the Public Forum, learn how to initiate the complaint process, who will investigate complaints, what to expect when a complaint is filed, and receive a 2018 update about Panel activity. The Independent Police Auditor also will be present to explain the Auditor's role in oversight. There will be a 45-minute period for audience participation. The Panel will respond to questions about the complaint form and Panel processes. Ten, three-minute time slots will be available to attendees to comment about issues related to the Panel's jurisdiction (comments on specific complaints may not be presented). Land Use News - Land use items of interest also feature sidewalk connectivity projects:

- Construction of the new permanent **Jefferson Fire Station #18**, located at 3101 Hodge Place in Falls Church, currently is on schedule, and is anticipated to be completed in fall 2019. When the permanent fire station is operational, fire and rescue services and apparatus at the temporary station (currently at the intersection of South Street and Annandale Road), will be relocated to the new station.
- A spot improvement project is proposed on the east side of **Backlick Road**, **between Hechinger Drive and Industrial Road**, to complete a sidewalk network. The project entails a minimum 5foot sidewalk, and a northbound left turn lane into the office complex at the intersection of Backlick Road at Industrial Road. Weather permitting, survey work will be done intermittently this month until March 2019 in preparation for the project's design phase.

Tree Care during the Holidays – Living Christmas trees are an option to enjoy during the holidays, and as a landscape feature throughout the year, but they require special treatment. Living trees in containers, or balled and wrapped in burlap, should not be carried by the stem. Allow the tree to adjust to a heated room in an unheated garage or shed for several days prior to bringing it indoors, and for several days before bringing it back outside. Living trees require plenty of water while indoors, and should only remain in the home for no more than 10 days, or they will start to grow. Trees should be planted immediately or, if the ground is frozen, placed in a shallow hole and covered with mulch until it can be planted.

Cut Christmas trees also are popular during the holidays. When bringing a cut tree home, make a fresh, straight cut across the bottom of the trunk, at least 1 inch (or more) above the old base to help the tree absorb water. Keep the tree well-watered to ensure it stays fresh and does not become a fire hazard. Do not place Christmas trees near heat sources such as candles, radiators, fireplaces, or space heaters. Some trees may absorb a gallon or more of water during the first day, so keep the cut trunk immersed in water at all times. When the holiday tree is taken down, it may be disposed of at the curb or recycled for free (for trees less than 8 feet). Trees also may be repurposed for mulch, winter protection for tender vegetation, or burned for fuel. VDOT is Ready for Snow Season – The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) is ready for snow with plow-tracking technology, and online resources for residents to use. VDOT has budgeted more than \$205 million for winter weather, has more than 700,000 tons of salt, sand, and treatment abrasives, and more than 2.1 million gallons of liquid calcium chloride and salt brine. More than 2,500 VDOT crewmembers, in addition to contractors, are available for snow removal statewide. **Highlights for Snow Season 2018-2019**

How You Can Help:

- Monitor forecasts frequently;
- Adjust commutes, telework, and avoid driving if possible;
- Park in driveways or park on the odd-numbered side of the street.
- Do not shovel driveway until plows have come through;
- Have enough gas, wiper fluid, proper tires, medication, and an emergency car kit;
- Be patient: crews need time and room to work.

The Quick 411 – I sometimes put things in my recycling bin that I assume can be recycled, and I have been wondering what happens to recycled items these days. Can Fairfax County offer any information? Yes, and that's a good question. The worldwide recycling market has changed dramatically in recent months, especially because of "Operation National Sword" in China. Here in Fairfax County, the local third-party recycling processor says nearly 30 percent of material received is actually trash. To do our part in this worldwide process, we need everyone to focus on reducing the amount of contaminated materials placed in recycling bins. There are ways to help stop the practice of "wishful recycling" – placing items in the recycling bin because you think they probably will be recycled.
